Welcome to Kinver High. I am the proud Headteacher of Kinver High School and I am delighted that you are considering joining us. I hope that this prospectus will give you a flavour of what we can offer your son or daughter throughout their time at secondary school and would encourage you to come and visit us to discover more.

I joined Kinver High in December 2019 and was pleased to find a team and community that had ambitions that match mine, to create a world class environment in which our students could learn and progress.

I am delighted to announce that in December 2021 OFSTED graded us 'GOOD' in all areas, following a decade of poor judgements.

Located in the beautiful, rural village setting of Kinver, we serve a wide catchment area and currently have students who travel to us from: Stourbridge, Swindon, Wombourne, Bobbington, Cookley, Kidderminster, Bridgnorth and Wolverhampton. Whilst we are a non-selective school, students and their parents choose us, because of discerning traditional values.

As an Invictus School, we believe and uphold all the values of the Trust. Value One: 'that every day, in every way, our students come first' is embodied by all who work at Kinver and ensures that all of our students are recognised and successful. This coupled with Kinver's friendly atmosphere, unique 'family feel' ethos, elite experiences and unique opportunities, make me confident that you'll want to get to know us better!

Reassuringly, our priorities are clear as to what feel makes us, a successful school.

We believe that:

Parents who wish to apply for a place at other times during the year should contact the school.



Curriculum

Our Curriculum Intent

We engender our students into lifelong learners who progress onto positive destinations, fulfil their high aspirations and make a positive contribution to society.

We have high expectations of everyone; each member of our school community is nurtured and supported to develop academically, socially, emotionally and morally to be the best they can be. Every interaction between our members is well planned, deliberate and meaningful. Learning happens everywhere in our school, in a variety of different ways and together with our curriculum, we ensure that all students, regardless of starting points or barriers, enjoy learning and leave school equipped with the learning behaviours, acumen and skills to achieve academic success. We engender our students into lifelong learners who progress onto positive destinations, fulfil their high aspirations and make a positive contribution to society.

Kinver High School and Sixth Form offers a broad, balanced and ambitious curriculum. We continue to operate with a traditional 3-year Key Stage 3 and 2-year Key Stage 4. During Key Stage 3 students follow a broad curriculum. There is the opportunity to explore a wide range of subjects and experiences, developing new interests and skills along the way.

All students have the opportunity to study the full range of subjects, in order to allow them to discover and reach their full academic and creative potential. Our curriculum enables students to develop the knowledge and skills required to be successful and take advantage of the range of opportunities offered once they leave Kinver High.

Although there are some subjects that all Key Stage 4 students will study including Mathematics, English and Science and either History or Geography, through our options system we endeavour to enable our students to follow their interests and pursue their strengths. There is a broad range of subjects

designed to cater for the needs of all. Our aim is to provide a curriculum to meet the needs of all students with some vocational subjects offered alongside GCSE options. Decisions at KS4 are rooted on the principal of 'choice' and all decisions are always made in the best interests of students. However, we remain ambitious for all our students, and will always continue to encourage all of our students to choose the most challenging and appropriate qualification that will best prepare them for their chosen future pathway.

Preparation for life beyond school is a priority at Kinver High School and all students receive careers talks and guidance on making job applications, interviews and other work-related topics, as well as completing a work experience placement in KS4.

Each year more students choose to continue their education Post 16 at Invictus Sixth Form. Invictus Sixth Form is one Sixth Form based at 3 Invictus schools, Kinver High, Ellowes Hall and Wombourne High. Kinver High campus is inclusive and seeks to meet the needs of

a wide range of students by offering a broad range of courses. Many students choose Invictus Sixth Form as the average class size is typically smaller than other sixth forms allowing for more individual learning and support and since relationships with their teachers is well established. Being part of the Invictus Sixth Form broadens opportunities for our post 16 students by enabling them to access courses in all Invictus schools. Learning to Lead Students' Personal Development





Personal Development Intent

At Kinver, academic success and the personal development of our students are of equal importance for students to be "the best they can be". We see it as our responsibility to develop Britain's future leaders. Therefore, our curriculum extends beyond the academic and our wider opportunities for enrichment and personal development ensure that all students have access to a rich and broad set of experiences; enabling our learners to become confident, resilient outward thinking successful young citizens who seek out, embrace and excel in the opportunities life presents; with thought, consideration and kindness. We aim to engender a community who will always show a willingness and commitment to the positive shaping of modern Britain.

Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Development

All students study RE and Ethics which provides a comprehensive and balanced opportunity for students to explore a wide range of themes and issues. This helps to develop and deepen students' knowledge of Religious Education, Fundamental British Values - democracy, rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and understanding of those of different faiths. Whilst not a faith school, we consider the teaching of RE instrumental in equipping our students with both the knowledge, understanding and moral code to become successful ambassadors in today's Modern Britain and find that the teaching of RE & Ethics aligns well with our traditional school values. In addition, we see the subject as fundamental in supporting the development of student oracy and debate skills.

Learning Skills Programme

At Kinver High School and Sixth Form we firmly believe that education should not be a transient process which concludes with external examinations at the age of 18 years. In view of this, Kinver High School has a successful Learning Skills programme for all Year 7 pupils. The programme, which consists of a double teaching period every week, is based around the principles of Personal Learning and Thinking Skills (PLTS) and helps to equip students with a secure foundation in the skills necessary future years to become successful, confident lifelong learners.

Recently added to our programme, in 2021, was Forest School, this programme supports and develops student's exploration and understanding of the natural world in our very own Nature Reserve, adjacent to the school.

Student Leadership

Student Leadership and our development of future leaders is integral to the ethos of Kinver High School. It is our aim that all students have the opportunity to contribute to Kinver's community and practise captaincy by taking on a leadership role during their time with us.

Students are encouraged to take an active part in shaping the future of the school through such roles and are involved in decision making processes. Being a student Leader also supports students in improving their oracy, confidence and independence. All opportunities for this, are encouraged and celebrated.

Our Student Leadership groups are open to all students and are ever increasing, and we are

always open to new ideas from students who want to establish new groups. It is hoped that as students move throughout school, that they will choose to join more groups and take on more challenging roles. We have many students who join us in Year 7, already aspiring to become prefects in Year 11. We welcome, celebrate and nurture this ambition.

The Prefect Team in Year II head up the Student Leadership team, led by our Head Boy and Head Girl and their deputies. These prestigious roles are awarded to students who embody all that we hope a Kinver student should be and their roles include giving speeches, leading at events such as open and parents' evenings, supporting other student leaders and role modelling exemplary student behaviour. We hope that all students will aspire to become a Prefect.

Leadership roles are available for all students and students are actively encouraged to take up roles. Leadership roles include being a House captain, being a member of the school council where students share and discuss ways in which the school community could be improved.

Other leadership groups open to all year groups includes our: Eco Leaders; Charity Leaders; Sports Leaders; Subject Ambassadors; Grange Guardians; Literacy Champions & Librarians and our Engineering Champions – 'Red Flag Racing Group'

Sixth Form students play a pivotal role in our Academic Peer Mentoring Programme with Year 10 and 11 students. We encourage mentoring of younger students throughout school, with Year 8 Transition Buddies supporting Year 7, Year 9 Literacy Champions supporting students in Year 7 and 8, and our team of Pastoral Leaders being available to all students.

We hope that having read our student leadership opportunities your child has an interest in being a part of our team. Shaping students into future leaders and supporting them to develop their own skills for the next stage of their life and career really is at the heart of what we offer at Kinver High and we hope that your child will 'Engage, Succeed, and Aspire to Lead'.

Expectations & Student Support



Our Curriculum Intent

At Kinver a positive and respectful culture of high expectations and established routines ensure that the behaviour, conduct and the attitudes of students is good. We believe that every student is important and that every student can be successful. Within our learning community we expect every interaction to be positive and meaningful; for students to demonstrate good behaviour, manners and conduct towards one another and have positive relationships at all levels. We want students' experiences of school to be enjoyable, yet challenging, as well as being rewarding and fulfilling. All students at Kinver High should be able to enjoy a secure learning environment in which they feel safe, secure, confident and able to learn. Students should demonstrate a commitment to their learning and strive to be the best that they can be, at all times.

Our expectation at Kinver High is that all students have the right to:

- Learn without distraction and the responsibility to support the learning of others.
- Grow and flourish as individuals and have a responsibility to allow others to do the same.
- To be respected and have a responsibility to treat others the same.
- To be safe and have a responsibility to keep others safe in school.
- Expect kindness, courtesy, care, cooperation and consideration from all members of the school community.

We believe that:

 Good attendance and punctuality to school must be valued by all and common place.

Promoting Positive Behaviour for Learning

There is a positive learning culture throughout the school with many students taking advantage of the opportunities to study independently outside of lessons. All staff build and sustain positive relationships with students. Staff plan high quality, engaging and purposeful lessons; are friendly and caring; and freely offer their time to provide a wide variety of out of hours learning, extra-curricular activities and enrichment opportunities. Our classrooms are environments in which high quality teaching and learning can take place. Our 'Classroom Code of Conduct' ensures that all students are familiar with the classroom routines and expectations which is underpinned by the '3Rs Kinver Habits'.

Students, parents and carers are supported by a strong Inclusion Team, made up of: a Head of Lower School (Years 7-8), a Head of Middle School (Years 9-10) and a Head of Upper School (Year II and Sixth Form); an Inclusion and Achievement Manager; Heads of Year who are non-teachers; a SENDCo and are led by an Assistant Headteacher. We also buy into a wider team of external support such as Educational Psychologists and Welfare Officers, School

Counsellors and Independent Careers Guidance. This team is focused on ensuring that students and their parents are supported and challenged to be able to achieve their full potential.

Able, Gifted and Talented and SEND Provision

We believe that all students deserve the right to be given opportunities to enable them to achieve their full potential. Kinver High School & Sixth Form will ensure that all learners are nurtured and supported to develop academically, socially, emotionally, and morally to be the best they can be.

Supporting our students involves the identification of student needs and the implementation of responsive teaching to complement learning. Our SEND Team, together with the 'Den' facility, provide students with additional learning support should they need it. In the classroom, teachers are proud to provide high quality teaching, personalised and differentiated, that ensures students make solid progress.

Our most able students are consistently stretched through the provision of challenging lessons and engaging teaching. Students build extensive cultural capital through educational visits and a tutor programme that develops an understanding of high culture and academia. Students at Kinver High School & Sixth Form are afforded the opportunity to develop their

skills; be they intellectual, sporting, physical, social, creative or artistic. As a school we are committed to maximising the full potential of our learners.

Peer Support

Our students have access to an exceptional peer support network called the 'Worry Warriors'.

This comprises of a group of highly committed and personable Year 9 students, who have received specialist training from CAMHS and are line managed by our SENDCO Mrs Roberts. These students provide an alternative support network for new and current students through a series of informal drop-in sessions and by their attachment to all Year 7 form groups.

Kinver High School also benefits from a Prefect system of Year II students as well as some mentoring from Sixth Form students.

The Grange

The Grange, featuring our Guinea Pig Village and Rabbit House supports mental health and wellbeing of our students, as well as offering students the opportunity to learn and care for the animals.

Our guinea pigs also serve as student Literacy Reading Buddies and provide a weekly listening ear, for many of our students to practise and further develop their reading skills.



Uniform

It is the policy of the Governors that our students should wear the correct school uniform and a high standard of personal appearance is expected at all times. School uniform relieves students of anxieties over wardrobe and image, builds a strong school identity and enables the students (who are by far our best advert) to represent the school with pride in the local community.

The uniform is designed to be inexpensive and yet distinctive and smart in black, grey and pale blue.

Pale blue shirt – short or long sleeved (worn with the top button fastened)

Black tailored logoed school trousers available from Totally Uniform, Kingswinford or other non-logo'd smart plain black trousers (in accordance with uniform policy).

Trousers must be worn full length and not worn to expose the ankles.

Boys may wear a plain black belt with their trousers, no other style of belts are permitted. Clip on school tie

Dark plain grey or plain black ankle socks

Smart black polishable shoes – no canvas shoes or trainers. Boots are not permitted. Shoes must be completely black in colour. Laces must be black, with no metal buckles.



Girl's uniform

Black blazer with school crest Grey jumper with crest (optional)

Pale blue shirt – short or long sleeved (worn with the top button fastened)

Black tailored logo'd school trousers or skirts are available from Totally Uniform, Kingswinford. All skirts must be knee-length

Logo'd skirts come in two styles: ribbon banded drop waist pleated skirt or straight.

Trousers must be worn full length and not worn to expose ones ankles.

A non-logo'd straight black knee length skirt may be worn (in accordance with uniform policy) Clip on school tie

Dark plain grey or plain black ankle socks, or black opaque tights

Smart black polishable shoes – no canvas shoes or trainers, no high heels. Boots are not permitted. Shoes must be completely black in colour. Laces must be black. No buckles.

There are some other rules regarding other items of dress and accessories that you must follow:

- Other clothing: Clothing worn underneath school uniform must not be visible.
- Coats/Jackets: Coats and jackets should not be worn inside of the classroom.
 Denim jackets and hooded sweaters are NOT ALLOWED in school and should not be substituted for a coat or school jumper.
- Jewellery: You are allowed one flat ring and a watch.
- Ear Piercings: Students are allowed one pair of small studs or sleeper rings for ears. Ear stretchers/flesh tunnels/flesh plugs are NOT ALLOWED.
- Other piercings: Such as nose studs, rings, facial piercings are NOT ALLOWED.

- Accessories: No other fashion accessories (such as sweatbands, bangles, necklaces) are allowed to be worn. No bracelets are allowed except those worn for recognised religious reasons.
- Hair: Hair should be neat and tidy. If hair
 is dyed, it must be in natural colours only.
 Hair decorations and bright/multi-coloured/
 patterned dyes are not allowed. Hair bands
 or scrunchies etc. should be plain black or
 dark blue in colour.
- Patterns cut into hair / eyebrows, such as tramlines and shaved heads are not permitted.
- Make-up: Light make up is permitted. If students attend school with heavy make-up or an excessive application of fake tanning cream they will be expected to remove it.
- Nails: Nails must be short in length. We permit the wearing of types of nail polish including gel or acrylic, but only if the colour is nude or pale. Vibrant, bright or fluorescent colours including red will not be permitted. The wearing of long, false or nail extensions continues to be prohibited as does the wearing of any nail embellishments or jewels on nails for Health & Safety reasons. This will be strictly enforced and bright varnish/nail art will be removed in school.

Any student who fails to adhere to these rules will have sanctions applied to them as appropriate. Persistent refusal to adhere to school rules could result in students being sent home in order to return in the correct uniform.

Rewards,

Recognition & Celebration

At Kinver a culture of recognition and celebration that recognises the individual and their efforts, progress and achievement is what drives further success and achievement. Recognition, reward and celebration is at the heart of what we do every day at Kinver.

Rewards & Recognition

At Kinver High we offer two pathways of rewards; curriculum and pastoral.

Our pastoral pathway rewards students using a holistic approach rewarding students for their achievements, efforts and successes in a variety of aspects of school life. Students can be awarded Star of the Week by their form tutor, gain a Head of School Commendation on a monthly basis or a Headteacher's Commendation on a termly basis.

Our curriculum pathway is where students gain recognition from their teaching staff and departments. Each half term there

is a rewards assembly where student achievements are celebrated.

Student accrue reward points at Kinver and these can be earned in all aspects of school life. Our reward points are given when students exhibit specific learning skills or qualities. Some of these include being ambitious, confident, independent or demonstrating perseverance. Students can also earn community points for contributions to the school community. All reward points are added onto students' inspire profiles and are visible to students and parents. Reward points also contribute to our school House System.

Celebrating Success

Celebrating student success is a huge part of life at Kinver High. In addition to our half termly rewards assemblies we also have special 'one off' reward events to celebrate and recognise students such as 'Cake and Cordial' with the Headteacher or a Summer Ice Cream with the Head of School. Sporting medals and and a variety of trophies are also available as part of our Inter House competitions programme.



Recognition, Reward and Celebration Evenings

Twice a year we hold our 'Reward, Recognition and Celebration Evenings' for parents and carers. During these formal events, students are nominated for special awards and certificates in a variety of categories. These prestigious events are very popular with both students and our parents / carers during which students are formally presented with framed certificates, awards or trophies in front of a large community audience. Formal photography takes place at the event and the evening is always followed by food, revelry and is a night in which our students' success take centre stage.





Invictus Education Trust was created in March 2015 by a group of like-minded schools: Crestwood, Ellowes Hall Sports College, Kinver High and Wombourne High School. Two schools have since joined us, Leasowes High School in Autumn 2016 and Pedmore High School in September 2018. Rufford Primary School became the first primary school to join us in September 2021 further strengthening an already thriving Trust.

Collaboration across our Invictus schools is integral to us. We are now fortunate enough to be in a really strong position to have a range of educational settings across our Trust: Primary, Secondary, Sixth Form and Alternative Provision. Although our schools retain their identity, we have built a successful model from which we work closely together in order to learn from each other and share good practice. Our fundamental purpose for this is to ensure our students have the best educational experience possible during their time with us. Our students also have regular opportunities to collaborate through joint learning experiences. This level of partnership makes us quite unique, in comparison to other Multi Academy Trusts, due to our locality and determination to be the best that we can be. Our innovative Invictus Sixth Form, which is open to everyone, is a perfect example of how both staff and students work together simultaneously. Invictus Sixth regularly appears at the top of league tables and leader boards for progress. All of this is made possible by our expert staff and the fact that we ensure all Invictus students are not only transported to their lessons by us but are also equipped with a free laptop and free text books for their studies, throughout their time with us.

Our Invictus Subject Directors are specialist expert leaders who work alongside Heads of Department, and their teams across all of our schools, in order to lead the curriculum and ensure our students receive a quality first education. This model also ensures consistency in learning and a wider support network for our teaching teams. The focus of the directors' work is very much linked to each individual school's context and needs, spanning from Early Years all the way through to Sixth Form! In addition to the curriculum, our Subject Directors also work hard to ensure our students receive fantastic experiences and opportunities. One recent example of this is the fact that students from each secondary school visited Arvon writing Retreat, in Devon working with published poets and authors. This was fully funded by Invictus, championing our passionate writers. Another unique feature to us is that we are the only Education Trust in the country to become an

'FI in Schools Academy'. This gives our students amazing opportunities to participate in national challenges with Invictus teams entering in different divisions. In addition to this array of opportunities we are also proud to have the very best team of staff to ensure our students' education is at the very highest level. To ensure we keep abreast of local, national and even international research, training sessions for staff are organised, using expertise from both within our Trust and also using external organisations, if needed.

FI Teams must raise sponsorship and manage budgets to fund research, travel and accommodation. The challenge inspires students to use IT to learn about physics, aerodynamics, design, manufacture, branding, graphics, sponsorship, marketing, leadership/teamwork, media skills and financial strategy, and apply them in a practical, imaginative, competitive and exciting way. It was fitting to see Boris Johnson wishing the teams the best of luck in a recent media press release and recognising FI in Schools contribution to D&T, Engineering & STEM subjects in school.

At Kinver High School, we are leading the way in FI and are pleased that our students are at the forefront of this exciting opportunity and have a track record of success at a regional level. All students who want to become involved in FI Academy at Kinver High, will now get to use the new dedicated CNC milling machine, wind tunnel, 25 metre track, 3D printer on which they use professional CAD packages, to develop and test their FI prototype cars at Kinver High School. We believe that these are the unique and elite experiences that make sure that students from Kinver stand out from the crowd.

Kinver High School's FI in Schools Teams went from strength to strength in the 2022/2023 academic year. Winning a total of 9 awards in the Regional Finals, across Entry and Development Class. Including Best Engineered Car and Fastest Car.

Our development team, ION Racing made the national finals at Leeds University. This was the first time Kinver High School students had made the national finals. The finals took place over 2 days and our students represented themselves and Kinver High immaculately. Competition was fierce at the finals and they did not come away with any awards, but they are now working towards FI Professional Class.

As we move forward, we look to develop our first all-girl team and we hope to win many more awards next academic year.



FI Academy is open to all interested students as part of our Extended School Day Enrichment Programme on a Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons. Students wanting to start their FI journey will develop team building skills, will discover more about FI racing cars, develop an informed view about careers in engineering, Formula I, science, marketing and technology.
